Presumed author:

John Mark

- travelled with Barnabas and Saul (Acts 12:25, Acts 13:5)
- left Barnabas and Saul early (Acts 13:13)
- travelled with Barnabas (Acts 15:36-41)
- cousin of Barnabas (Col. 4:10)
- connected to earliest Christians (Acts 12:12)
- close relationship with Peter (1 Pet 5:13)

Date:

Early to mid 50s AD (generally agreed upon by scholars)

• most scholars believe Mark was earliest gospel to be written

Where, Why, Who:

Most scholars throughout history agree that John Mark wrote in Rome, and was perhaps there with Peter. He may have written for several reasons: to record Peter's eye-witness account of Jesus' life, to encourage the Roman Christians, and most importantly to share "the Good News about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God." (1:1)

Views on the Ending:

Mark 16:9-20 is identified in most Bibles as "not appearing in the earliest manuscripts." Many people believe it was added later in order to complete the story. They argue that Mark 16:8 makes sense as the intended ending because it matches the tone, style, and purpose of the book.
